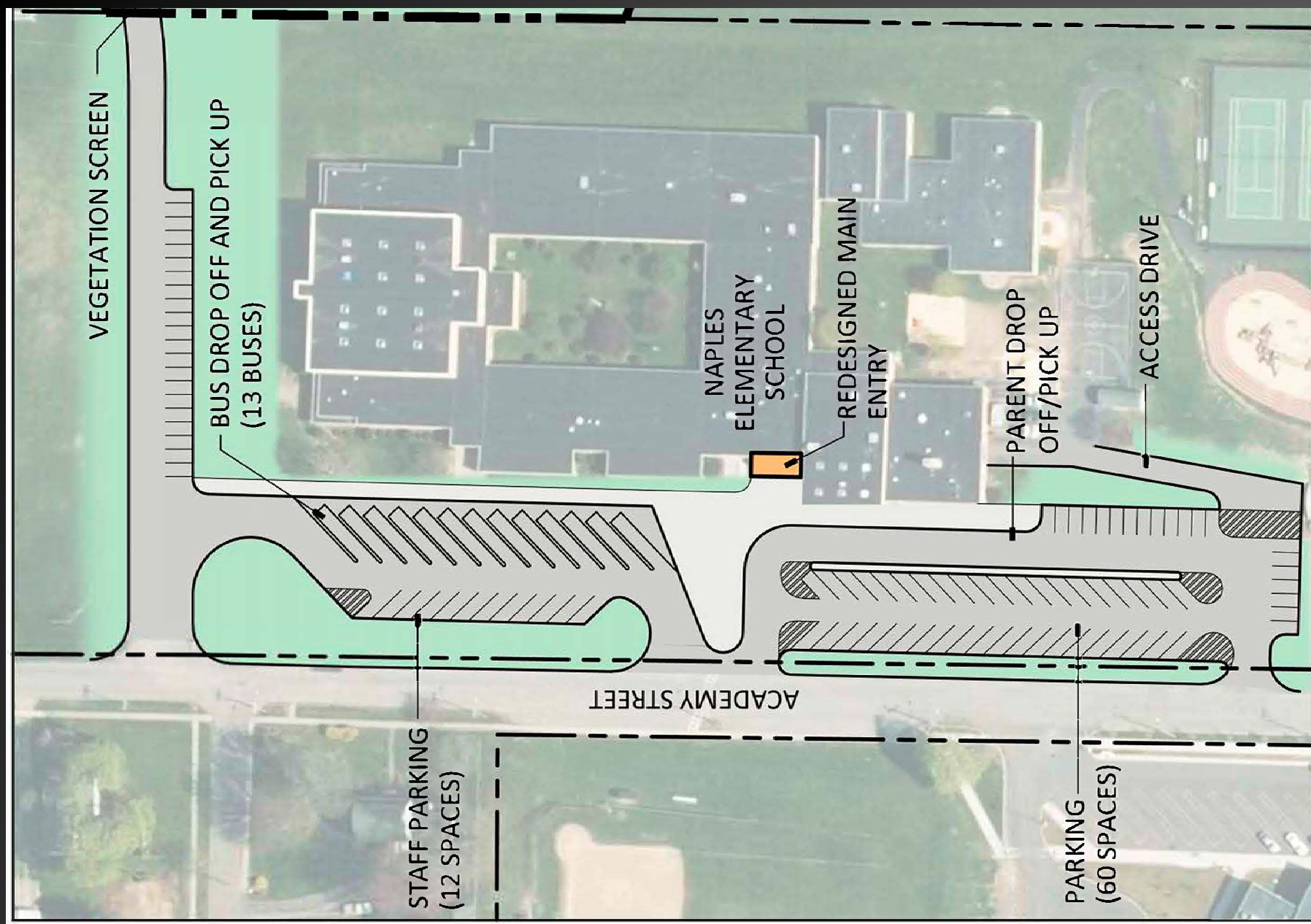
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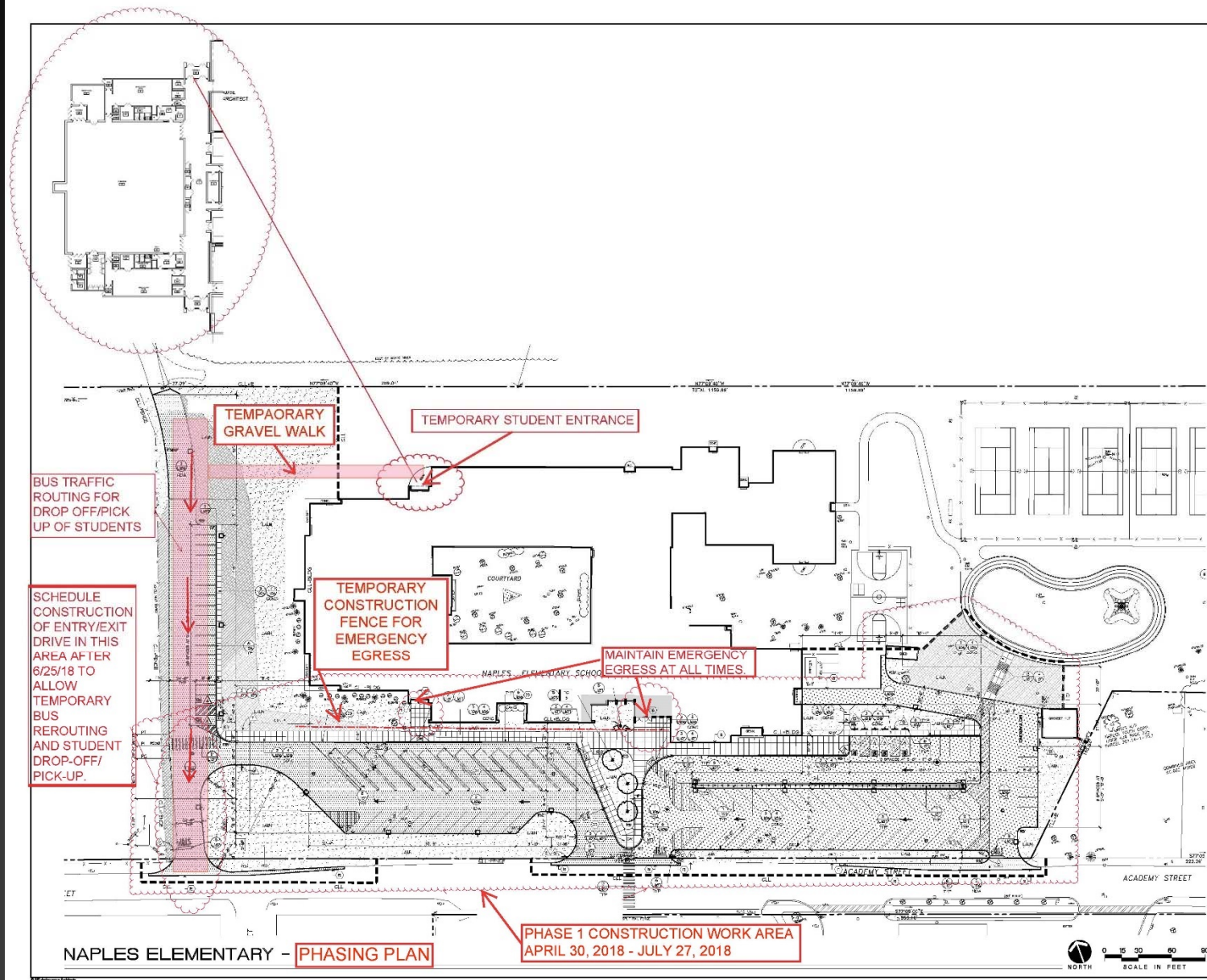

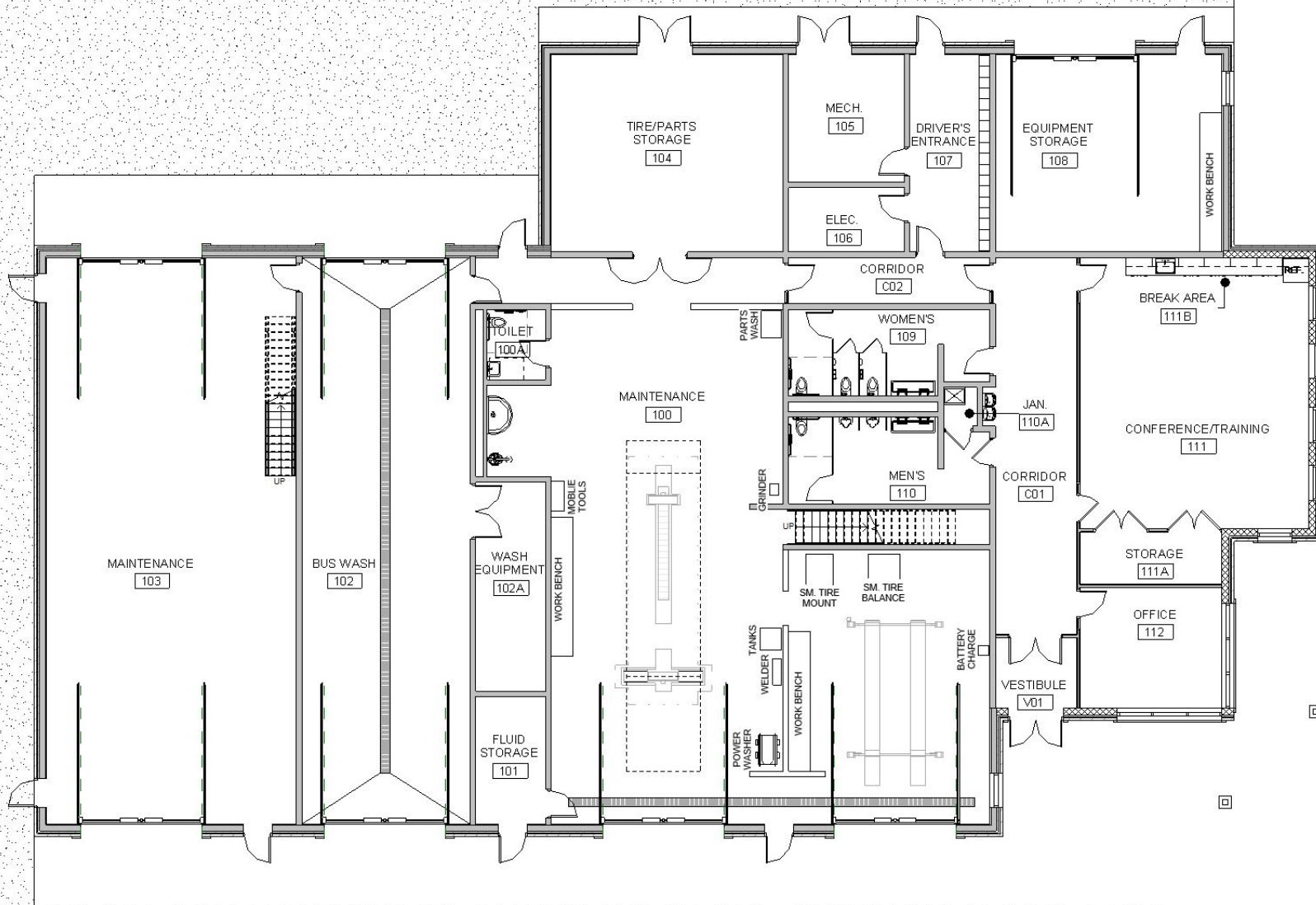

Bus Garage Site Plan

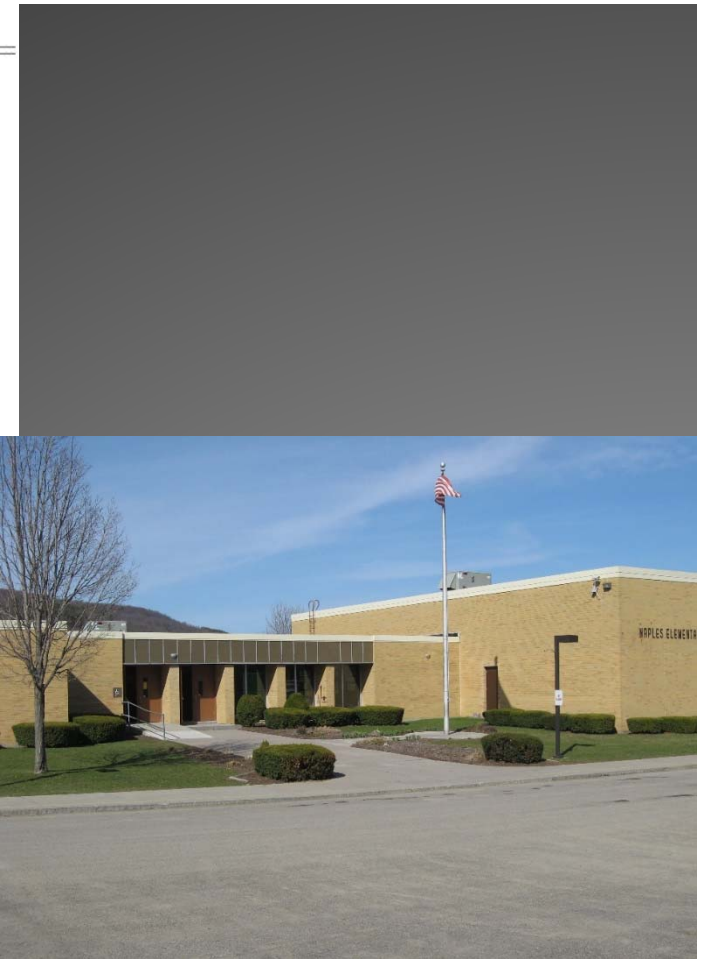
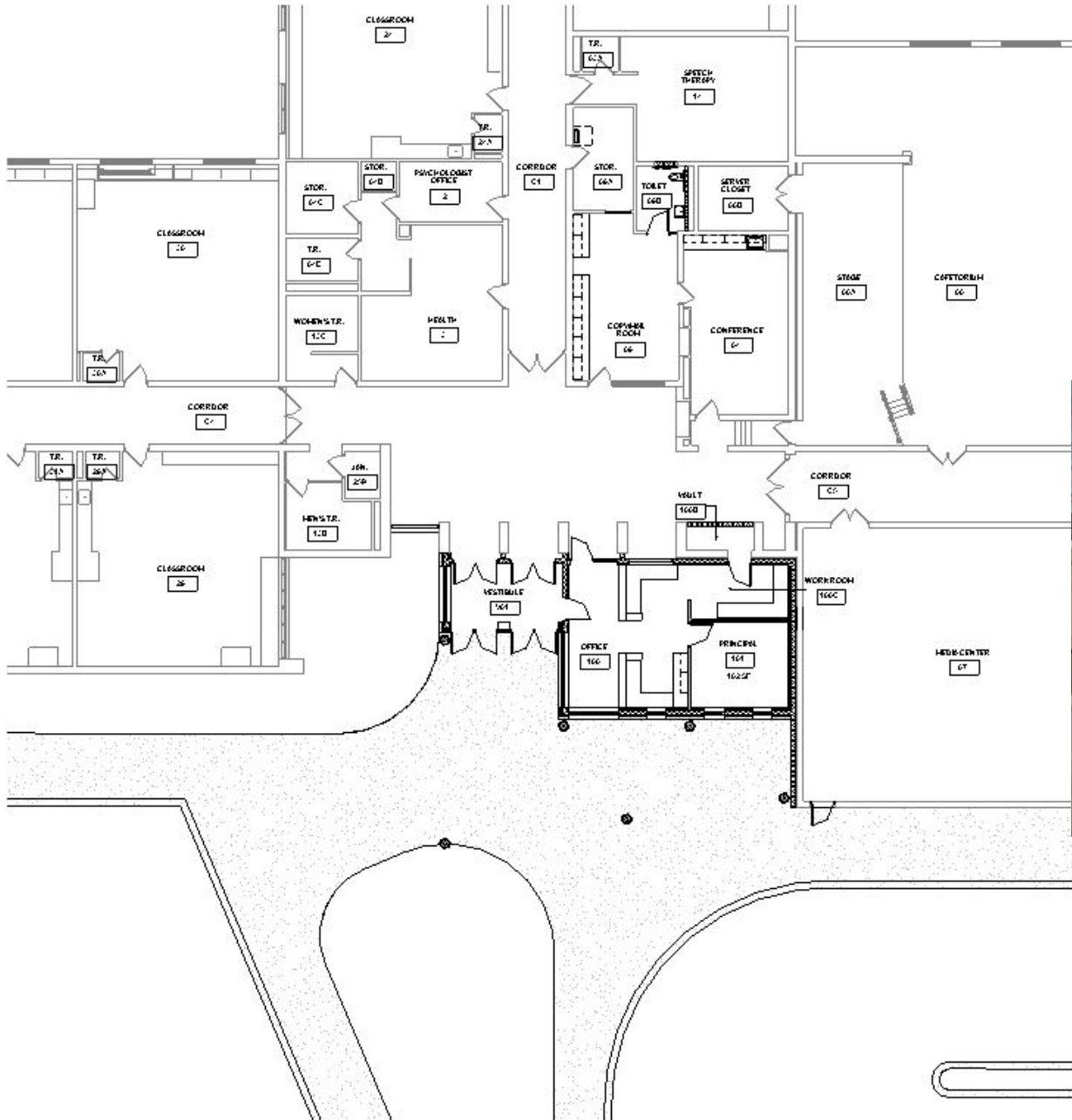


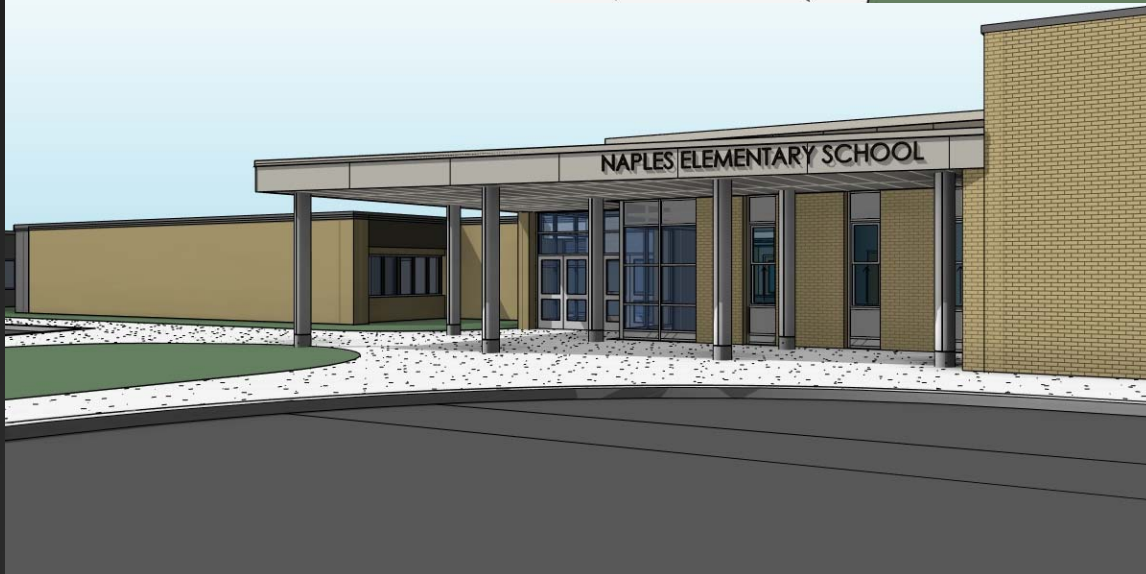

Budget Process

Property Tax Levy Limit

- School tax represents the largest support (55%) of the District's budget

- Our wealth ratio impacts this reliance on property taxes

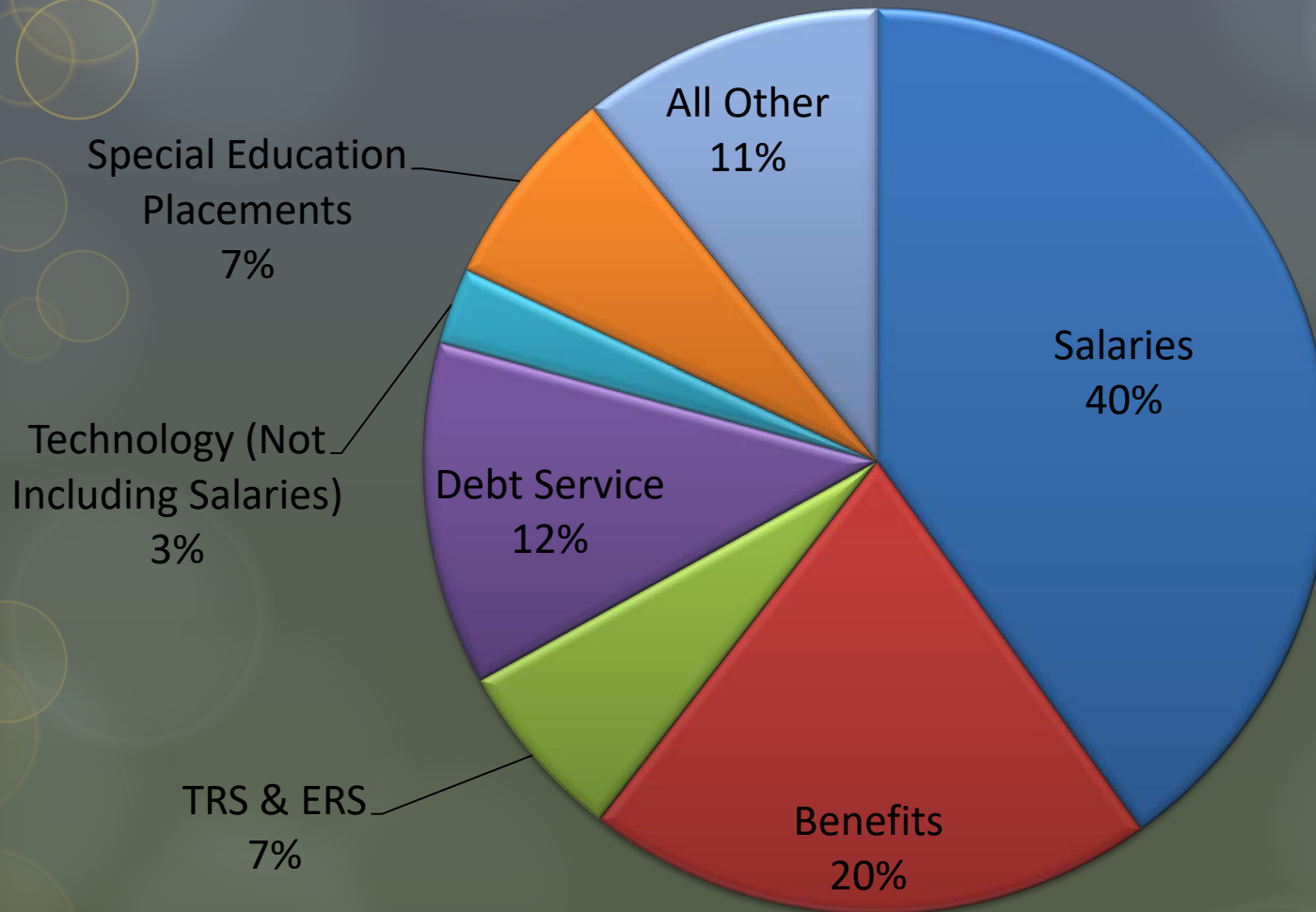
- Capped based on a complex formula that is tied to volatile variables

Property Tax Levy Limit Cont.

- Is not a 2% tax cap
- The District's limit for 18/19 is *estimated to be* 3.21%
- Estimated total increase allowed by the tax levy limit = \$352,839
- A 1% increase in the tax levy raises approximately \$109,947
- ESTIMATED: \$11,347,578

¹Personnel costs account for approximately 70% of the budget.

² "All Other" includes heating, electric, books, supplies, contractual agreements, uniforms, etc.

Reserve & Fund Balance Use

Per BOE adopted Reserve and Fund Balance Use Plan:

- Overall reduction of reserves, fund balance, and debt service use of \$200,000.
- These are exhaustible funds that should not be used to balance a budget (if at all possible) long term.
- Plan is subject to change based on final expenditure proposal and final state budget allocations.

Estimated Expenditure Budget

- \$20,200,000 – \$20,300,000
- 1.54% - 1.91% increase
- Presently includes the addition of 1.0 FTE Special Education/Elementary Level Position (of the 1.54%-1.91% increase, approximately 0.5% is this position).
- Decisions regarding the following will need to be made:
 - Mental Health Supports/Family Support Center/Other
 - Additional Arts in Education Funding
 - Benchmarking Tools (High School & Elementary)
 - Clay Target Team
 - Cross Country Team
 - Other Instructional Software (Newsela/No Red Ink)

Naples Elementary School Board of Education Updates ~ March 2018

Learning Walks and Regional School Visitations

Regional School Visitations continue and Naples Elementary had the pleasure of hosting visitors from other schools on January 10th. Areas that the Elementary highlighted included:

- Learner centered models of instruction including technology integration with 1:1 devices, blended learning and station rotation
- STEAM Room/Tech Lab
- Reading Recovery/LLI
- Flexible Seating
- Co-teaching
- "Forest Fridays" - Outdoor Learning Education Model

On Thursday, March 15th, our 3rd grade team is traveling to William CSD for the day. On that morning, I will have the pleasure of attending a RIC (Regional Instructional Council) meeting where Brittany Ritz, Abby Castle and Seth Almekinder will present on "Innovative Instructional Practices at the Elementary Level". On March 29th, Naples will host Learning Walks for Art Teachers in our region.

Instructional Coaching Update:

Curriculum Mapping

- Teachers in grades UPK-5 have met for one half day (or more) to continue work on updating Math curriculum maps, as well as completing ELA maps. Common assessments have been chosen or developed in ELA.
- Mrs. Grove met separately with ELA and Math teachers in grades 6, 7, and 8 after school to adjust maps. Grade levels are planning to get together again to make necessary changes or add to their existing maps.

Coaching

- Mrs. Grove is working with new hires from last year and this year in both the Elementary and Jr./Sr. High School. This includes classroom visits, attending mentor meetings and 1:1 meetings to share resources.
- Support continues for all teachers in the transition to new Science standards as well as new programs such as Guided Reading, Daily 5 Reading, Daily 3 Math, Discovery Education tech-books, and Schoology.
- Mrs. Grove will attend a professional development opportunity next week on updates to the Next Generation ELA and Math Standards and bring the information back to our staff.

- Mrs. Grove continues to provide ongoing training to our paraprofessionals regarding the implementation of various academic interventions
- Mrs. Grove also ordered and organized additional books (housed in our Book Room) for guided reading groups at Fountas and Pinnell reading levels A-V

Data Meetings

- We had another round of data meetings at the end of February. Mrs. Grove creates the schedule for these meeting, facilitates the process on the two days, and assists teachers in inputting data into our shared grade level documents.



"Increasing STEAM Opportunities and Student Engagement":

Mrs. Wordingham continues to work with teachers in grades 4-6 to offer additional STEAM activities for students not enrolled in chorus (which currently has 82 students signed up!). This is a once a week opportunity for 45 minutes. Our staff has truly embraced "the Arts" in STEAM, and this is another example of making sure

all students have enrichment opportunities. Students are allowed to sign up on a google doc for what activity interests them. The teachers plan and run the group activities. Here is an example of what was offered in February:

The beads/safety pins are to share and trade with friends.
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<u>Marble Run</u> Mrs. Wordingham Build a marble run with paper tubes and tape	<u>100 Days of School</u> <u>Miss Brennan</u> What can you make with 100 random items?	<u>Construct a Roller Coaster Model</u> <u>Mrs. Arsenault</u> Do you love roller coasters? You will have specific supplies and must design and construct a roller coaster model. You must work together and complete the challenge within a time limit.	<u>Mindful Hike</u> Mr. Almekinder Students must arrive to class prepared to be outside for 45 minutes. Dress for the weather. Boots, hats, winter jacket, and gloves/mittens are required. Students not deemed appropriately dressed will be sent to study hall.
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Our Safety Patrol is in the process of reviewing our District Code of Conduct to make what we are calling a "kid friendly" version of the document. This is a truly thoughtful group of students, and we had a very insightful conversation around student rights and responsibilities. Carrie Grove and I will continue this work with the group, and the document has also been a topic for our Elementary Shared Decision Making Team. This group of staff and community members also feels it is important to create a version that highlights the information using language our Elementary students might more easily understand. Both of these groups have a strong desire to serve their school community and help keep our building a safe environment for learning. I truly appreciate their commitment to the work. ☺



A huge thank you to Mrs. Lester and our volunteers from our PTP (Parent Teacher Partnership) ! This group continues to amaze me with their dedication in providing great opportunities for our students through kind (and entertaining!) fundraising. The PTP organized a Valentine's Day fundraiser that included the sale and delivery of cupcakes to students from their parents or other family members. The group has also organized a student fun night on Friday March 23rd (flyer attached). And if you haven't already heard...Mr. Frahm is currently in the lead in our "Kiss the Pig" contest. Students and staff can put their spare change in jars in the office to vote for Mr. Frahm, Ms. Saucke or Mrs. Clark. Whoever has the most money in the end will kiss an adorable pig at our Music in Our Schools school assembly and evening concert! ☺



We celebrated "Read Across America" Day from 1:00-1:30 on Friday, March 9th. (Typically this is on Dr. Seuss's birthday, but that snow day postponed our plans!) As a school we will all went out into the hallways from 1:00-1:30 to read. Students were encouraged to bring in pillows, blankets, PJs...whatever makes them feel comfortable when reading. They were able to pick out what they love to read...so it may have been a favorite book, magazine, comic book, etc. Our staff also brought their own favorite reading material and joined our students during this fun opportunity ~ it was a great way to model the joy of reading. ☺



March is Music in Our Schools Month! We have started our theme for this year, "Music in Movies". Here are the musical happenings this month:

1. The musical, "James and the Giant Peach" kicked off the month with a quick teaser for the Elementary Students. If you didn't get to see it, you missed a fantastic show!
2. Mrs. Austin is playing some songs in the morning on the PA that have been featured in various movies. Students and staff are encouraged to let he know their favorites and she will include them.
3. Mrs. Austin has hidden the image above around the building for students to find and collect. There is going to be a prize this year for the class that finds the most K-3 and 4-6, at the end of the month.
4. There is an optional door decorating contest during the last week of March. Teachers who want to participate will decorate their classroom door with a "Music in Movies" theme...

5. The Concert featuring all performing groups is on March 20th at 1:00pm and 6:30pm in the Elementary Gym.

This year grades 6, 7, and 8 will take both ELA and Math assessments on the computer. Grade 6 has done CBT (computer based testing) for their field testing over the last 2 years. By being willing to do their state assessments in this format this year, it will give us an excellent opportunity to learn the process and prepare for when the state mandates CBT for all grade levels on 2019-2020. Right now the challenge is that we have to share iPad keyboards with the High School. Therefore the following dates have been chosen from the "testing windows" to allow for the sharing of resources. Please note that both Paper and Computer Based Testing for ELA and Math are only 2 days in length this year. ☺

- ELA Grades 7 & 8 Computer Based Testing: 4/10-4/11 (Tuesday, Wednesday)
- ELA Grades 3-5 Paper Based Testing: 4/11-4/12 (Wednesday, Thursday)
- ELA Grade 6 Computer Based Testing: 4/12-4/13 (Thursday, Friday)
- Math Grades 3-5 Paper Based Testing: 5/1-5/2 (Tuesday, Wednesday)
- Math Grade 6 Computer Based Testing: 5/1-5/2 (Tuesday, Wednesday)
- Math Grades 7 & 8 Computer Based Testing: 5/3-5/4 (Thursday, Friday)

Note: All 3-8 ELA and Math field testing will be administered in a Computer Based Testing format. We were notified that 6th grade is again assigned to field testing this year.

Mrs. Radin-Snaith and Mrs. Clark have done an outstanding job planning for the CBT Testing. We have already met with the teachers in Grades 6-8 to review information regarding the testing session and plan for any possible challenges. Next week Mrs. Ashton, Mrs. Piedici and I will hold a Grade 3-8 State Test Security and Proctoring Meeting. All teachers in Grades 3-8 need to attend, as well as support staff that proctor exams. Mrs. Piedici has been working with our Special Programs Departments on a plan for students who require testing accommodations.

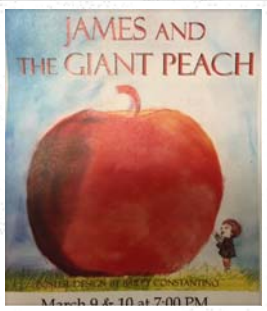


NAPLES HS STUDENT & STAFF CELEBRATIONS: JAMES & THE GIANT PEACH

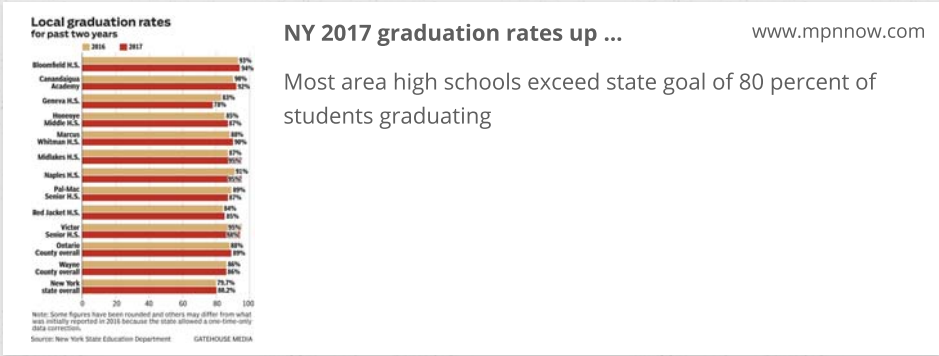

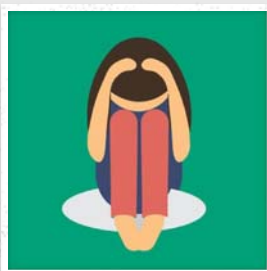

WHY ZEBRAS DON'T HAVE ULCERS

1 in 3 adolescents have an Anxiety Disorder, and the number only appears to be increasing (National Institute of Mental Health website). Anxiety is often seen as a negative trait. However, anxiety was built into the human system to help humans survive situations such as encountering lions in the wild, dealing with other humans who threatened their

existence, and any other physical threat. The Fight-Flight-Freeze response is meant to send adrenaline and oxygen to limbs so that you can defend yourself and increase your chance of survival. The only problem is, we do not regularly interact with lions or dangerous wildlife and the stress response system was not intended to be long term.

Fact: humans are the only species on the planet that can create the stress response without there being an actual physical threat; we do it with our minds and thoughts. The problem becomes that we live in a world where worries and stress can be anywhere, and this system becomes overresponsive and actually damaging to both internal organs and the ability to function. Parts of the body that are not necessary for survival turn off. For example: if a student walks into a test thinking about how terrible they will do, and how their parents will be so upset at them, and they will never graduate, then they most likely will trigger that stress response, and the cognitive (learning) and memory parts of the brain actually shut down. Now imagine how often this happens to both children and adults. The positive?? One controls their thoughts, or can gain control through practice and being aware of when negative thoughts are happening.

So when you think about a zebra, why do they not have ulcers? The reason is that after they run for their lives, their brain does not continue to think about what would happen to their families if they died, or what will happen if they cannot find a meal later. They think about grass, and frolicking in the African savannah. Find your time to be at peace like a zebra. Do some deep breathing. Check out the app, "headspace," and take some time to slow down your brain so you can do more higher level thinking and functioning. Challenge your negative thoughts with evidence, ask yourself, "Is this fact or feeling," plan ahead when possible, go do something active, rationalize what you're thinking, and try to slow down if your brain is going a million miles per hour. Help yourself and your kids realize that you can get a handle of this with practice. Check out the book, [Why Zebras Don't Get Ulcers](#), by Robert M. Sapolsky to learn more about anxiety.

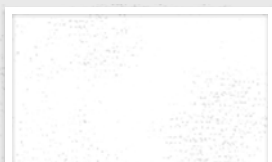
Reminders

- If your child is absent due to an illness, I would like to remind parents/guardians that the Center for Disease Control and Prevention recommends children stay home until they are symptom-free for 24 hours . This includes no fever without the use of fever-control medicines, free from vomiting, and free from diarrhea.
- Please encourage your children to wash their hands often, cover their coughs and sneezes, and refrain from sharing water bottles and food while at school. These simple steps can help prevent the spread of germs.

Here are a few reminders about medication at school:

- A student is not permitted to carry any medication on his/her person in school, or on the school bus, or keep any medication in his/her school locker(s). Exceptions may apply, however, for students diagnosed with asthma or other respiratory illnesses, diabetes, or allergies who have a note from their health care provider to self-carry medication.
- Health care provider and parent permission is needed for ALL prescription and over the counter medications (including Ibuprofen, Tylenol) used at school or school-sponsored activities.
- Parents/guardians are responsible for having medications delivered directly to the school in a properly labeled original container by an adult. Students are not allowed to transport medication from home to school.

“In spite of everything I still believe that people are really good at heart.” This sentiment, written by Anne Frank in her diary while she and her Jewish family were hiding from the Nazis during World War II, still resonates so deeply today. On Thursday, March 15, 2018, the eighth-grade class at NCS will have the great pleasure of hearing these words spoken aloud during a live performance of “The Diary of Anne Frank” at Geva Theater. This opportunity goes hand-in-hand with the performance and analysis of the play in class, as well as the historical study of World War II in Social Studies class later in the year. Students will also have the opportunity after the performance to meet with Holocaust survivors who currently live in the Rochester area.

MS LAUNCH: DASA THEMED GRADE 7 AND GRADE 8 “LUNCH BUNCH”

Outdoor Adventures at Naples High School

What is Outdoor Adventures?

Outdoor Adventures is a hands on skills based course designed to teach students all about the Outdoors. In many schools around the country it is offered as a PE course. Students will gain life long skills from this course that can be applied to the Outdoors.

Topics Covered

- Camping/Outdoor Cooking
- Fishing
- Hiking/Backpacking
- Geocaching/Orienteering
- Sportsmans Education
- Survival Skills
- Boater Education
- First Aid and CPR
- Winter Activities/Snow Sports

Camping/Backpacking

Students have the opportunity to learn how to set up camp, how to pack a backpack and most importantly how to plan an overnight trip.

Outdoor Cooking

Students learn how to start a fire for cooking or survival skills. Each student researches their favorite recipe to try cooking over an open fire, in a dutch oven, in aluminum foil, or just on sticks.

Orienteering

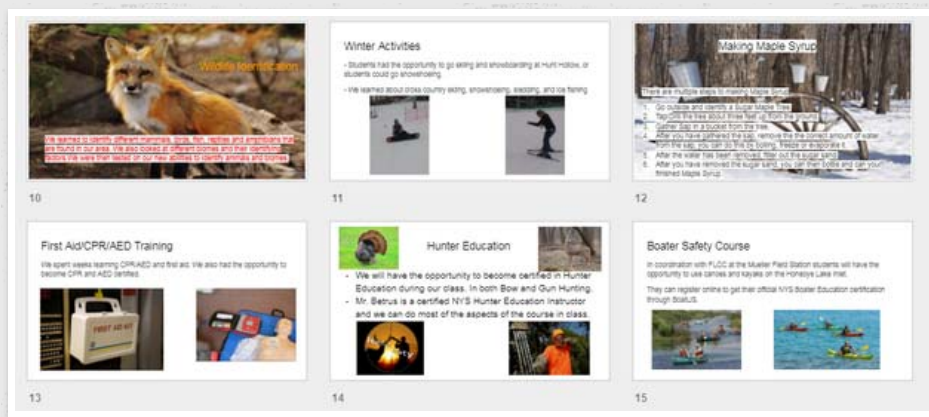
- An activity that involves navigating your way through various checkpoints, you're only given a topographical map and a compass.

Geocaching

Geocaching is the recreational activity of using an electronic device to track and log a virtual object, or "geocache", hidden by other geocachers. Community Service Opportunity - In October 2017, the Outdoor Adventures class teamed up with National Honor Society members to help a local community member with a bridge repair and general trail cleanup.

We also attended Wegmans where we met with the Pharmacist and talked about food as medicine. experienced tragedy see first hand that they are not alone-- and they see how my family has survived.

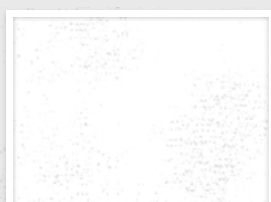
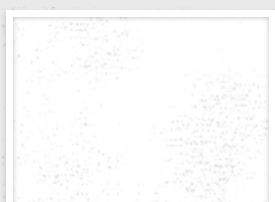
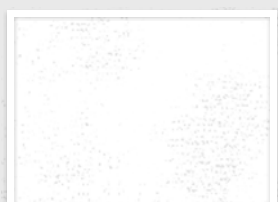

- In the spring of 2014, the Naples Central School District Wellness Committee started a student running club for young adults in Naples. There is a community group, Naples Running Group, that exists for adult runners. Each year many community members participate in the St. J's 5K (<https://www.stjs5k.org/>). 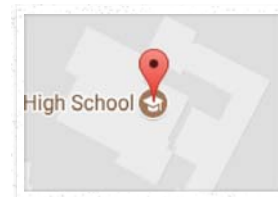

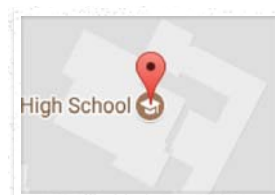

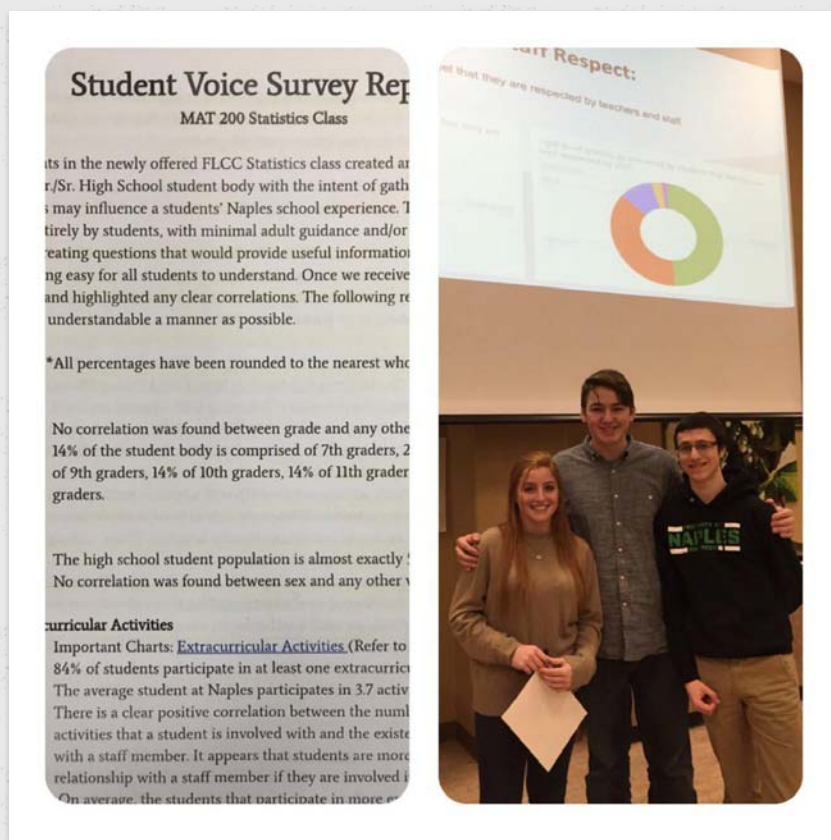


BATTLE OF THE BOOKS

Kudos: On February 8th we welcomed Jeramy Clingerman, Bonnie Cazer and Cheryl MacDonald from Marcus-Whitman CSD to visit our 6:1:1 classrooms. They were able to see the talent of our teachers, support staff and school psychologist that support these programs. I would like to thanks Tammy Matthews, Jodie Schwartz and Kyle Inda for opening your classroom doors and allowing us to visit learn from their programs.

Training Update: We have had a busy few months of trainings. I attended a CPSE training on February 5. This training was beneficial to me and my learning as well as gave me an opportunity to connect with other CPSE chairs. On March 13th I attended a training on Function-Based thinking with Hailey Lehman. We will be working with Hailey and a team of High School staff on April 19th to look together at our discipline processes for students with disabilities and reflect on changes that we can make.

Regional Connections: On March 12th I had the opportunity to meet and collaborate with regional CSE directors from Honeoye and Bloomfield. We are working together to see how we can provide shared services including, transportation, CTE courses, student programs and professional learning for our teachers. We are planning to continue to meet and collaborate as we look into what we can do together regionally.

Department Update: As a department we are hard at work preparing for the NYS ELA and Math tests. We are ensuring that student testing accommodations are up to date and supportive to our students participating in CBT and paper testing.

CTE Courses: One of the areas of need for our students with disabilities is access to CTE courses to allow them to work toward a CDOS credential. Currently we are sending our students to GST BOCES to receive access to special education support in these classes. On March 8th we invited Jeremy Hughes to our school to work with a team of highschool staff, myself, and Bridget. Jeremy was able to give us an overview of CTE, CDOS and graduation requirement information at this meeting. We will be working with him to set up another day for him to work with our team. Our goal is to develop CTE courses in district which would benefit all students to work toward their graduation outcome.
